Waterlilies! Royalty in Our Ponds

Waterlilies, the star attraction of our ponds are really easy to grow, but they can be daunting until you know just how to do it.

What kind of pot should you use for lilies? Well, there are different schools of thought on that. A plastic dishpan or something of similar size and shape is a good idea because the rhizome will have the room to spread out. A lily rhizome is a lot like an iris; it spreads or fans out in one direction. If you have it backed into a corner of the pot and have it pointed the right direction, then it can grow for a year or two in that pot easily. Also it only takes two or three inches of dirt in a dishpan, so the pan is not so heavy when you pull it out of the water. When the rhizome has grown to the edge, it will either push its way up or down. If it goes down, the growth will be stunted and it will actually grow under itself. If it goes up, it will jump the side of the pot. That is ok up to a point. When the roots grow outside the pan, just in the water, the lily really takes off. It will have huge leaves and blooms because it's taking nutrients directly from the water. Of course, the down side to this is that it will become so large and overgrown, it will be very difficult to handle when you do get ready to divide.

A big problem with dishpans is that they have no drainage. Over time the anaerobic bacteria will grow from lack of oxygen and when you unpot the lily it will have a terrible smell. The longer it is left in the pot, the harder it will be to force in fertilizer tabs and lilies are heavy feeders.

Another option for a pot is to use old nursery pots. Many of them are too deep and not wide enough so are not a good choice. Mum pots or pots specifically made for lilies are ideal. They are no more than six inches tall and at least a foot wide. If you have anything like this, it will be great for lilies. Of course, you do have to keep the dirt in the pot when you first pot the lily. This can be done by lining

with landscape fabric, newspapers, coffee filters, paper towels, etc. Just something that will hold the soil in place for a while. Eventually the roots will fill up the pot and bind the dirt together. Over time the lily roots will push through the holes and into the water. Again, your lily will be huge with huge blooms but you will also have a mass of white roots free floating in the water.

What about fertilizer? Lily tabs are great, if you can afford them! If you want to have lots of pots of lilies but don't want to spend a fortune to keep them fertilized, there are other methods. For several years now, I have been using granulated time released fertilizers with great success. I buy whatever is cheapest while looking for a high number on the phosphate and low numbers on the nitrogen and potash (1st number low, 2nd number high, 3rd number low). When you pot the lily just cover the bottom of your container (an inch or less) with dirt and sprinkle generously with fertilizer. Put in more dirt and then your lily rhizome. My lilies are always full of blooms and I don't have to spend a lot of time or money on trying to poke in lily tabs.

Next month we will talk about potting and fertilizing tropical waterlilies. You do things much the same, but not quite.
